# Arizona Legislative update by Tom Waddell, AZ Council of Chapters

There are currently four bills in the Arizona Legislature that are veteran specific that need our immediate support. Three are under consideration in the House and one in the Senate. Jeff Peckron, your legislative liaison, has two letters that you can cut and paste as desired to send to your legislators using the members links at <u>AZLEG.GOV</u>. The HB2672 letter goes to your senators and the SB1155 letter goes to your representatives. Contact Jeff at <u>jeffPeckron@yahoo.com</u> for copies of the letters.

**HB2672**: Property tax exemptions for 100% disabled veterans - Still no action in the Senate Committees **SB1155**: Ensures pay and income tax equity for members of the U.S. Public Health Service and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. - Still no posted action from the Senate committees **SB1704**: Authorizes the use of Veteran Donation Fund monies to support Arizona State Veterans Homes. - "Do Pass" from the House Federalism, Military Affairs & Elections committee on 3/10, no action in House Appropriations or Rules committees

**SB1021**: Grants in-state tuition to contracted ROTC cadets at state universities. - "Do Pass" from the House Appropriations committee, no action in the House Rules committee



The optimal location to obtain the most relevant and current legislative information at National MOAA level is on the National MOAA website at: <a href="https://www.moaa.org/">https://www.moaa.org/</a>. After logging into the site with your *User Name* and *Password*, click on the "*Advocacy*" link at top of the page. Here, you can click on any of the secondary links (shown to the left) in order to navigate all the most relevant and current legislative information at national level.

Much of the most important information applicable to CMC is within the "Legislative Action Center" (LAC) secondary link. Once you click on it, you will see the LAC page header shown below:











Not all CMC members are "registered" in the LAC. *Please register to help bolster our support of key service member and veteran related legislative issues! NOTE:* Individuals must register themselves. If you are not registered, the upper-right corner (where the name "Kurt" is shown, will instead show "Sign Up". Then click on "Sign Up" and follow the instructions on the website. Additionally, under "MOAA Chapter Affiliation" make sure to select "AZ12 – Catalina Mountains Chapter".

**A strong recommendation:** After you register and sign in, **DO NOT "Logout"**. If you do, the next time you enter the LAC you will have to re-register!

# Member in the spotlight - by Kurt McMillen

When our Catalina Mountains Chapter (CMC) publishes the Sentinel newsletter, we enjoy highlighting the accomplishments of our CMC members. All our members have diverse backgrounds. We think you will appreciate our members' contributions over their previous career, and within CMC and outside of our chapter now.

This "spotlight" shines on our own COL(R) Marty Lenzini. An important prelude: The following condenses a significantly more detailed narrative of Marty's exemplary career. If you want further information, please see Marty to "fill in the blanks"!

Marty grew up as a kid from a working family in a suburb of Chicago. Marty had no previous military knowledge; his grandparents came from Italy and no family members served in the Armed Forces. Marty attended Catholic schools through high school and, as he now says, "The discipline at these schools kept him 'in check'", but Marty was well known for the corporal punishments he received at school and the trouble he got into when away from school. Years later, Marty looked back at how he grew up and realized his behavior actually shaped his eventual fighter pilot confidence.

Marty's family could not afford college tuition. A high school counselor "rescued" him and provided Marty a Navy ROTC scholarship application. Only two students from his high school graduation class of 200 won a prestigious NROTC scholarship (Marty was one of the recipients). Marty attended the University of New Mexico (UNM) because his dad grew up in Southern Colorado, and Marty had an uncle who worked at the Los Alamos Laboratory. At UNM, Marty chose to enter the

Marines due to his Marine Officer instructor; the instructor had a "warrior mentality", he was a good leader, and he was an excellent mentor. Due to the example set by the instructor, six of the top seven NROTC graduates in Marty's class chose the Marine Option and became Marine Second Lieutenants.

Marty's first stop after graduation was The Basic School (TBS) at Quantico, VA. At TBS, Marty learned that all Marines are riflemen, and this focus was instrumental in developing a bond between the infantry on the ground and the Close Air Support (CAS; and as Marty says, "the best CAS in the world"). Marty decided that becoming an aviator was the best fit for him in the Marine Corps.

Marty's next move was to Pensacola, FL (the home of naval aviation). He flew the T-34 and T-28 at basic flight training in Florida and the F-9F and F-11F at advanced flight training in Kingsville, TX. Marty received his Gold Wings 18 months after arriving in Pensacola in May of 1963.

Marty's first Marine squadron was VMA-533 at Cherry Point, NC where Marty was checked-out in the A-4B aircraft. Upon arrival Marty learned, "Whatever your job is, even if it is the coffee mess officer, treat it as the most important job in the squadron." Marty heeded this advice throughout his career. In 1965 (now a First Lieutenant), Marty was then selected to attend the Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, CA and earn an advanced degree in Aeronautical Engineering. After the three-vear coursework (now a temporary Major due to the build-up of the Armed Forces), he was ordered to MCAS El Toro for A-4 refresher training in VMA-214, the Black Sheep Squadron. In two months of refresher training, Marty accumulated 110 hours flight time training new Marine pilots.

Marty finally got to the Vietnam war in September 1968. He was assigned to VMA-211, Wake Island Avengers, at Chu Lai, Vietnam. Marty's job was Assistant Ops Officer. Marty completed 350 combat missions, was awarded four DFCs (Distinguish Flying Cross) and 24 Air Medals. Most of his DFCs were on



missions with troops in contact, bad weather and heavy enemy fire.

After Vietnam, Marty was ordered to the Attack Weapons Branch in Test Operations at the Naval Missile Center, Point Mugu, CA. He enjoyed being a test pilot and project officer for missile test and development. At the end of this three-year tour, Marty had qualified in the A-4, A-7, A-6 and F-4 aircraft.

The next tour brought Marty back to the Marine Corps at MCAS Yuma. He was assigned as the Ops Officer of the A-4 Training Squadron, where he trained new pilots and accrued a lot more flight time. At the one-year mark in the tour, the Group CO selected Marty to command the Tactical A-4F Squadron. Although still a Major, the Commanding General of the Wing concurred. Under Marty's command, the squadron quickly gained the reputation as a tough ACM (Air Combat Maneuver) adversary. After Yuma, Marty had a 12-month overseas tour with the 9th Marine Regiment. Initially, he was assigned as the

Air Liaison Officer (ALO) and later as the G-3 (a unique assignment for an aviator!). Returning stateside, Marty had multiple staff tours, including positions in OPNAV R&D (Research and Development) and one as the head developer of the Marine Corps POM (Program Objective Memorandum; a tough and important job). During Marty's tour as Development Coordinator for attack weapons and aircraft (OP-982), he designed a Laser Maverick development program which resulted in a strike weapon that the Marines and the Air Force rely on to this day. Marty subsequently attended the Naval War College and National War College.

While at the National War College, Marty was selected for promotion to Colonel and commander of the MAG-12 Aircraft Group in the 2<sup>nd</sup> MAW (Marine Air Wing). Being commander of the MAG-12 was a highlight of his career (which included a 12-month overseas tour in Japan).



Marty's final Marine Corps job was in Washington, DC at HQMC as the head of the Plans, Programs, and Budget Branch of Marine Corps Aviation. After three years of hard work, Marty submitted his retirement paperwork. Although he requested a small retirement ceremony with only the Aviation De-

partment in attendance, the USMC Commandant and the Secretary of the Navy showed up. This was a tribute to Marty's "above and beyond" performance and contribution throughout his career.

Shortly after retiring in October 1987, Marty went to work for Hughes Aircraft Company in Canoga Park, CA. At Hughes Aircraft Company he was assigned to the Strike Weapons Advanced programs. Marty retired from Raytheon Missile Systems (Raytheon bought Hughes Missiles in 1997) in 2009.

Marty's personal awards and decorations also includes two Legions of Merit. He has been a Member of the DFC Society Board of Directors for nine years and President of the Tucson Chapter of the DFC Society for ten years. Marty and his wife live in Saddle-Brooke Ranch and have six grown children. Thank you, Marty, for your exemplary contributions to our national security and to CMC!

Amenity Drive, Oracle, AZ 85623. Our speaker will be Paula Pedene, a primary 2014 Phoenix VA Scandal whistleblower.

In 2014, Paula became front-page news when she helped a doctor at the hospital expose the deceptive bookkeeping practices that were used to cover up how long veterans were waiting to receive medical care. She is also the co-author with novelist Doug Williams of the 2022 book on this scandal called *A Sacred Duty*. At our April 19<sup>th</sup> luncheon meeting you will be able to hear "the rest of the story" that started as early as 2010! The significance of the VA hospital issues uncovered will shock you.

According to Congressman Jeff Miller, Chaiman of the House Veterans Affairs Committee (Oversight and Investigations), "Paula Pedene is the invisible hero whose whistleblowing pioneered exposure of a national medical care breakdown for our nation's veterans. She speaks from the heart about the anguish, frustration, and stress from relentless retaliation as a Whistleblower. (cont on next page)

Paula is a nationally recognized and award-winning public relations professional. She is nationally Accredited in Public Relations (APR) and is a prestigious Public Relations Society of America (PRSA) College of Fellows member. Paula is also the founder of two nonprofits supporting our nation's military veterans, and is and an inductee into the Defense Information School Hall of Fame and the Arizona Veterans Hall of Fame.
